This came about from a Mission Forward Visit that we made to Mosque a few years ago and it's implementation was delayed by busy schedules and COVID - but on Sept 26th it happened. About 16 of us went for a walk on the pathways and sidewalks near the Mosque. We plan to do it again and hopefully again. It was expressed that we don't need to complicate it; let's keep it simple and walk together.

Over the past few months another Mission Forward idea is starting to take root as a few of us in the neighbourhood have begun to meet to talk about the needs of seniors and how to help folks to stay in their own homes. Some ideas are emerging, but what I am noticing is the energy being generated as ideas are shared and connections nurtured.

We are in the season of autumn - the season of harvest. Through this pandemic time, there have been lots of seeds and ideas that have been laying dormant. I wonder what will find growth as we move forward?

The Thexton Garden has entered its fall cycle and the yield is now reduced to root crops and potatoes. We had an excellent season with a bounty of fresh vegetables to donate to the Food Bank. Look at John Gingerich's Facebook photos to see what we mean. The mounds of chard, beets, carrots, onions, tomatoes and potatoes mimicked an artist's palette.

Our one big challenge was with the Japanese beetle. We lost! They turned our bean leaves into lace and reduced our bean harvest to zero

Worship - In-Person - October 17th - 10:30am

After 19 months of RUC worship including prerecorded YouTube videos and Sunday morning Zoom gatherings, we are working toward inviting folks back into the sanctuary on October 17th. Council has agreed that worship will begin at 10:30am.

In this pandemic time, public health regulations guide our way and so at this time we will gather with the following public health measures in place for those who gather in person:

- self assessment of symptoms (if you are not feeling well, we ask that you stay home)
- screening upon entry and collecting contact information
- seating will be set up to maintain physical distancing (limited to 70 persons)
- masks are to be worn
- hand sanitation expected
- requirement of full vaccination for all those eligible to be vaccinated (the proof will only need to be shown once); children under 12 and those with medical exemptions are exempt from this requirement
- no singing or coffee hour

As public health measures change, our practices will be evaluated.

The worship service will be available by live-stream - and more details will follow about how to connect with it. We know that there are a variety of personal choices about vaccination and in person worship attendance. We trust that we will continue to find ways to care for one another as we discern our way through these pandemic times.

Public Health Guidelines

The Ontario regulations that came into effect on September 22nd that require proof of full vaccination for those over 12 apply to gatherings, meetings and other events held at the church. There is an exemption for a worship service, but Riverside Council decided to have consistent rules and practices for all RUC events. Information will be shared with rental and user groups with the expectation that they will follow the public health regulations.





Here are some recent stories associated with activities of the RUC Amnesty International Group.

HONDURAS: Edwin Espinal, a long-time social activist, was arrested in January 2018, denied bail, imprisoned without trial or due process, sent to a military-run, high security jail for violent criminals for 19 months, amid death threats and without adequate food or drinking water. Edwin's wife, human rights defender Karen Spring of Elmvale, Ontario, valiantly began campaigning for his release. After an outcry by Amnesty International, he was freed on bail. Now, he faces a trial on Monday, September 13 - and the dangerous prospect of being thrown back into jail. We have been asked to write in his defense.

BELARUS: Human Rights defenders, Ales Bialiatski, Valyantsin Stefanovich and Uladzimir Labkovich remain in pretrial detention and face trumped up charges in retaliation for their human rights work. Their prosecution is part of the systemic crackdown of civil society and human rights activists - ongoing since the post-election protests of August 2020.

EGYPT: Twelve death row prisoners, convicted and sentenced to death for their involvement in protests related to the ouster of former president Mohamed Morsi from power in July 2013 are at imminent risk of execution. AI opposes capital punishment. We have written opposing the sentence.

RUSSIA: Mikhail Iosilevich is being targeted for peacefully exercising his rights to freedom of expression and association. He is accused of cooperating with an "undesirable" organization, a "crime" punishable by up to six years' imprisonment. We have written asking that charges against him be dropped and that he be immediately released.

GOOD NEWS: Write for Rights 2020 efforts have paid off. Four prisoners of conscience have been freed, including journalist Khaled Drareni in Algeria, satirical poet Paing Phyo Min in Myanmar, Nassima al-Sada in Saudi Arabia and Germain Rukukiin Burundi. All have been released from prison! Thanks to those who wrote on their behalf, and on behalf of all our people.

The Ottawa Organic Farmer's Market continues to operate every Saturday from 10am-12pm. There is quite a bit of traffic and all Health restrictions are followed. They even help us advertise our Mini Bazaar events.




Save all Wilson's Independent Grocer (Alta Vista at Bank) receipts and those of your friends and good

2022 UCC Calendars



- * Patricia Power is continuing as a student minister with us, as she participates in the 2nd year of the Atlantic School of Theology distance education ordination program.

Nourishing Our Faith

Learning Opportunity: Indigenous Canada is a twelve-session online course through the University of Alberta that offers teaching to better understand the worldview of Indigenous peoples of Canada. The goals are to learn about Indigenous concepts of gender, and the traditional roles and responsibilities, and to explore the key issues facing Indigenous peoples today from a historical & critical view. Each part of the course is about 2-2.5 hours of learning.

On Tuesdays over the six weeks before Advent (19th October, 2nd and 16th November, and again in Epiphany (11th and 25th January, and 8th February) Patricia Power proposes to host a discussion on zoom to talk about what we have learned over the two week period, assuming that people will have taken a couple of sessions as preparation. The structure would be along the lines of what our learnings mean for the United Church, for Riverside United, and for us personally, although that is not set in stone and as a group we can discuss how else we would prefer to structure our conversations.
